The Trilogy of Destinations Season has been an adventurous and busy one for our patrons and dancers; starting with Symphony Under the Stars with Roanoke Symphony Orchestra, onward to the Historic Grandin Theatre with Répertoire, then a collaboration with the Taubman Museum of Art in the Swoon opening party. The score for the ballet Romeo & Juliet was composed in 1935, for a Soviet premiere in early 1940. The Prokofiev score will absolutely transport your emotions in every undulation of the dramatic story line. Southwest Virginia Ballet's premiere of Romeo & Juliet hit the stage in 2013, with original choreography by me; and staged here at the Berglund Center. We are so fortunate to bring it back once again, especially during the 460th anniversary of Shakespeare's birth!

This year's performance is dedicated to the memory of Father Joseph Lehman who played the role of Friar Lawrence in both of our previous productions of Romeo & Juliet. He truly was my inspiration for the role, and as a leader in our community and world. Father Joe (as everyone called the easy to love man) was so supportive of the arts in our region. For me, he's still one of us in the SVB family. In this production, Father William Buckley has agreed to play Friar Lawrence; thank you Fr. William, for following his lead.

This season will continue with performances: Hansel & Gretel with Young Artist Program of Opera Roanoke; Local Colors; Festival In The Park. Also, check out our social media and website for more information about us and our next season, INNOVATION 2024/2025.

Romeo & Juliet Synopsis of Scenes

Two Households, both alike in dignity, In fair Verona, where we lay our scene, from ancient grudge break to new mutiny, Where civil blook makes civil hands unclean. From forth the fatal loins of these two foes A pair of star-crossed lovers take their life...

### by William Shakespeare

### ACT I

**Scene I:** A square in Verona, around the year 1400. Daybreak. Romeo is greeted by his friends who try to rid him of his melancholy mood. Tybalt, upon seeing Romeo, picks a quarrel with him, rekindling the feud between the houses of Capulet and Montague.

**Scene II:** At the Capulet house. The house is in preparation for a ball. Lady and Lord Capulet introduce Juliet to Paris, who wants her for his wife. Juliet is teasing her nurse, who is trying to tell her that she is no longer a child.

**Scene III:** At the gate to the Capulet House. The guests arrive at the ball held in honor of Juliet's engagement to Paris. Romeo, Mercutio and Benvolio decide to disguise themselves and enter the ball.

**Scene IV:** The ball at the Capulet House. Among the multitude of guests, Romeo spies Juliet and is enraptured by her beauty. Mercutio notices that Romeo is entranced by her and diverts the attention of the guests. Tybalt, recognizing his enemy Romeo, confronts and unmasks him. Lord Capulet, fearing the festivities will be ruined, comes between them.

**Scene V:** The garden at the Capulet house. Deep in thought, Juliet lingers at her balcony. She discovers Romeo who awaits her, hidden in the shadows of the garden. They both feel love for each other, pure and strong enough to face any dagers.

### ACT II

**Scene I:** The square, late afternoon. The people are having a carnival in celebration of Saint's Day. When Romeo appears, Mercutio and Benvolio are disappointed at this distant mood. The nurse delivers a letter to Romeo in which Juliet agrees to marry him secretly at the chapel of her confessional priest, Friar Lawrence.

**Scene II:** The Chapel. Romeo asks Friar Lawrence to wed him to Juliet. After the marriage ceremony, Juliet must return to her parent's home without Romeo.

**Scene III:** The square, evening. The merrymaking of the townspeople reaches a climax. Romeo, who is now a kinsman of Tybalt, tries to stop the fight. Tybalt, however, kills Mercutio. Mad with fury at the loss of his friend, Romeo kills Tybalt.

**Scene IV:** Juliet's bedroom. Romeo, banned from Verona for killing Tybalt, has spent the wedding night with Juliet. At dawn, he flees the town. Juliet's parents have decided to marry Juliet to Paris as soon as possible. Juliet desperately tries to change their minds. At night, she leaves the house to beg Friar Lawrence for advice and help.

**Scene V:** The Chapel. Friar Lawrence gives Juliet a potion that will make her appear to be dead. Friar John, who is bringing the letter of explanation from Friar Lawrence, arrives too late to tell Romeo of the plan.

**Scene VI:** Juliet's bedroom. Coming home, Juliet pretends to agree to the marriage with Paris. When she is left alone, she swallows the potion and falls, as if lifeless, on her bed. Later, in the midst of the wedding preparations, Juliet is found seemingly dead.

**Scene VII:** The tomb of the Capulets. Juliet is laid to rest. Romeo enters the tomb and finding Paris grieving by Juliet's body, kills him. Believing Juliet to be dead, Romeo takes poison. Juliet awakens to find Romeo dead and stabs herself.

**PEDRO SZALAY** was born to Hungarian parents and is a native of La Guaira, Venezuela where he started dancing in local school by Ms. Machado. He received a scholarship at Ballet Nacional of Caracas, coached by Vladimir Isayev and many other national and international teachers. There he danced many of Nebrada's choreographed pieces. Later he traveled to New York City to be coached by Madame Darvash & performed with New York Dance Theatre directed by Frank Ohman. After New York, Szalay became a company dancer with Richmond Ballet from 1996 to 2006 where he was an inspiration for many choreographers & dancedpieces from Balanchine, Burn, Canaporoli, Lang, Soleau, Stevenson, Orff, Wainrot, Winslett & many others. He was also a

guest performer & choreographer with the Latin Ballet of Virginia. He has guest taught in South Carolina, Philadelphia, Virginia School of the Arts, Washington & Lee University & St. Paul's Ballet Company. Szalay served as a coach, choreographer for the School of Richmond Ballet & other Richmond dance schools. He served as Artistic Advisor for Chesterfield Ballet School. Szalay coached the Wheel Chair Miss Richmond. He currently teaches at Star City School of Ballet. In the summer of 2016, he was invited to be a guest teacher in Murcia, Spain at Robles Ballet School. Szalay, for almost 20 years, enhanced the lives of many 4th graders through his instruction of the Minds In Motion and Dance Español programs in Richmond, Charlottesville, Martinsville, Salem & Roanoke City Schools.

Beginning in 2012, Szalay developed a Spanish language, choreographed movement program called Dance Español for 4th graders in public schools. In 2013, he created a Ballet program for Middle Schools in Roanoke City Public Schools. January 2007, Szalay became Artistic Director of Southwest Virginia Ballet in the Roanoke Valley. He has since then strived for SVB to be recognized locally, regionally, nationally & internationally. In 2009, he was awarded the Perry F. Kendig Award for Outstanding Performing Artist & in 2010 named the best Local Celebrity for Charity Events by the Roanoker Magazine. In 2017, he received the Bransow Award in recognition of exceptional dedication & service to the Virginia Museum Community. Szalay has been a Resident Artist for Carilion Clinic Healing Art Program since 2013.

Szalay's choreography credits include: The Long Christmas Ride Home, for Flournoy Playwright Festival, Ties: A Railroad Ballet, Cinderella, Coppelia, Romeo and Juliet, Miss Richmond Pageant (2002-2003), the Miss Virginia Pageant(2009-2012), Like Winter Waiting (2012- 2014), Sewing Seeds with Ann Waldrop, Dominos for Charlottesville Ballet, Holidays Pops, Peter & The Wolf, Carmina Burana with Roanoke Symphony Orchestra, Excerpts of Act II of The Nutcracker, Firebird & Under the Tent with Roanoke Youth Symphony, Nick Cave, Norman Rockwell & many others for Taubman Museum of Art, La Traviata and South Pacific for Opera Roanoke. In 2017, he choreographed an original score in remembrance of the Virginia Tech tragedy. In 2019, he collaborated with Scott Williamson with a new project "Collective Euphonia" at Temple Emanuel, Roanoke, VA. In 2023 Szalay was presented with a resolution from the City of Roanoke as part of the Hispanic Heritage Month for leadership in the City



**FR. WILLIAM BUCKELY - GUEST ARTIST,** is a native of Long Island, NY, where he grew up. After graduating high school, he attended the University of Richmond, where he studied piano performance. Following his graduation from University of Richmond, he worked for three years as a church musician and choir director, most especially at Saint Bridget Catholic Church in Richmond. While working at Saint Bridget, he began to discern a vocation to the Catholic Priesthood. In 2017, he entered seminary formation for the Catholic Diocese of Richmond, studying at the Catholic University of America in Washington, DC. His time in seminary brought

him to serve in the Roanoke area for the first time: during the summer of 2019 at St. Andrew Catholic Church and 2020-2021 at Our Lady of Nazareth Catholic Church. Fr. William was ordained a priest on June 3, 2023 and subsequently began to serve as parochial vicar at the Basilica of Saint Andrew and chaplain at Roanoke Catholic School. Fr. William is excited to have this unique opportunity to be a part of this production of Romeo and Juliet!

**GRACE FRANK-REMPEL - GUEST ARTIST**, has been dancing for 19 years. She started at Roanoke Ballet Theatre and moved to The Dance Centre of Southwest Virginia in 2011. While dancing as a company member, performed roles such as Spanish, Marzipan, Snow Queen and Arabian. She also has performed in ballets such as Cinderella, Romeo and Juliet, and Coppelia. She was honored to spend several summers training at Bossov Ballet, Gelsey Kirkland Academy of Ballet, Summer Dance Company and Point Park University. She also enjoyed the opportunity to represent SVB in Prague, Czech Republic, at the New Prague Dance Festival in 2015. After more than ten Nutcrackers with SVB and eight years in the company, Grace graduated in 2018 from Christa McAuliffe School of Arts & Sciences



and graduated from Point Park University in 2021. Grace is currently in graduate school at St. John's College pursuing a masters in Eastern Classical Literature.

#### HISTORY

Southwest Virginia Ballet (SVB) has been a part of the community for more than thirty years & serves over 10,000 children & adults annually. SVB began in 1990 by Founding Artistic Director Tess (Terri) Post along with Associate Director Sandra Smeltzer. Ms. Post's vision was for Southwest Virginia to produce and support a regional ballet company that would provide pre-professional quality performances of varied repertoire including classical ballet, contemporary, and modern works.

The new company quickly became a part of the community experience and in its first year performed at Festival in the Park, with Opera Roanoke in Die Fledermaus, and had its premier Company performance at Virginia Western Community College. This was quickly followed up in 1991 by a production of The Nutcracker at Olin Hall, Roanoke College, with the first locally produced full-length production of The Nutcracker in many years. By 1993, SVB was performing The Nutcracker at the Roanoke Civic Center accompanied by the Roanoke Symphony Orchestra and continued to perform at Festival in the Park, Affair in the Square, as guests with the Rockbridge Ballet, and with Opera Roanoke in The Merry Widow and Rigoletto. SVB also performed two fulllength productions annually. In order to expand training and performance opportunities for company dancers, in 1993 SVB applied for admission to the Southeast Regional Dance Association (SERBA), a division of Regional Dance America. SVB hosted the annual SERBA Festival in 2003.

In 2006, Pedro Szalay joined SVB as instructor, co-artistic director, and choreographer. In 2007, Mr. Szalay became the full-time Artistic Director when Ms. Post relocated to New York. Under Szalay's direction, SVB company membership doubled in size & has gained regional, national, & international acclaim. Under the artistic leadership of Mr. Szalay, the annual production of The Nutcracker routinely brings together as many as 100 SVB Company & community members, both children & adults and has been recognized as the "Best Arts Performance" annually since 2018. Since 2006 SVB have partnered with the Piedmont Arts Association in Martinsville VA to bring arts education and performances to the area. In 2009, Mr. Szalay created his first original full-length ballet, TIES, in collaboration with musician David Austin, the O. Winston Link Museum, & the Virginia Museum of Transportation to bring the history of the railroad in Southwest Virginia to life on stage. He has also created full-length productions of Cinderella & Romeo & Juliet. Additional productions include Coppelia, The Firebird, & Reencuentro (which included alumni), as well as original works by many innovative choreographers. In addition to full-length productions, SVB performs throughout the year at area festivals & events & continues to collaborate with the Roanoke Symphony Orchestra, Opera Roanoke, the Taubman Museum of Art and other non-profit organization throughout the valley. In the fall of 2020, in the middle of the Pandemic, SVB collaborated with Blue Ridge PBS to film and broadcast our original production of the Nutcracker. This broadcast was seen by countless families worldwide, giving SVB the opportunity to spread the love of art and classical ballet beyond the Roanoke Valley. In the summer of 2020 SVB was honored to be featured in the first episode of Buzz 4 Good broadcast on Blue Ridge PBS. Through this episode, SVB has received opportunities to develop new marketing strategies and new branding. SVB has continued to be featured in several follow episodes and podcasts over the last four years.

#### ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Southwest Virginia Ballet (SVB) has served the community for more than thirty years & serves over 10,000 children & adults annually. SVB continues to serve as a training ground for regional dancers possibly seeking a career in dance or dance related fields. In its 33-year history, SVB's distinguishing characteristics continue to include professional instruction, free membership, free costumes, & regional participation, in that, many dance schools are represented in company membership. SVB's programs Minds and Motion which ran from 2005-2011, and Dance Español which has been going strong since 2012, created and instructed by Mr. Szalay, have brought dance and inspiration to youth in our schools. These programs have had an unmeasurable impact reaching over 200 Roanoke City 4th graders and over 250 Martinsville City and Henry County School students of all ages annually. Community outreach and collaborative endeavors have expanded to include performances at Dickens of a Christmas, Parks and Arts, Local Colors Festival, Virginia Science Festival, O. Winston Link Museum, History Museum of Western Virginia, Science Museum of Western Virginia, and Taubman Museum of Art among others. Company dancers continue to participate in readings at local public libraries and schools, as well as visits to Carilion Clinic to perform and bring cheer to pediatric patients.

Southwest Virginia Ballet has awarded scholarships through the Vaszary Scholarship Fund annually since 2009. As part of the program, "Southwest Virginia Ballet Gives Back", SVB has provides free tickets each year to clients of area human services organizations allowing them to attend The Nutcracker & spring productions.

#### RECOGNITION

The company, has not only received regional recognition but has also received international recognition at the New Prague Dance Festival winning first place in classical dance & first place in costuming in 2011. That same year, two SVB dancers were also recognized for individual talent. In 2013, SVB returned to the New Prague Dance Festival and received the Grishko Award , the equivalent of second place in the overall festival. At the New Prague Dance Festival 2015, SVB was awarded Second Place in Classical Dance, Second Place in Pedagogy of Dance (Pedro Szalay, Artistic Director), the Grishko Award, a Talent in Dance Award & a Special Participant Award, which is voted by peers. SVB once again returned to the New Prague Dance Festival in 2017 and was once again awarded 2nd place for Classical Dance and 3rd place for Pedagogy of Dance. In 2019, SVB was awarded 3rd place for Classical Dance. Since 2019, SVB has not been able to return to the New Prague Dance Festival due to the Pandemic and world conflicts, however, we look forward to representing Southwest Virginia again someday soon! SVB was first voted Roanoke's Best Ballet Organization in 2003 & Roanoke's Best Performing Arts Group in 2012 by the readers of Roanoke's City Magazine. SVB has also been honored to received the Best Arts Performance award consecutively since 2018, most recently we received the Platinum award in 2023. Additionally, SVB received recognition as the City of Salem Best Performing Arts Group in 2008 & was the first organization to receive the Art Venture Award from the Taubman Museum of Art for extraordinary educational & collaborative programming in 2014. In 2015, SVB was awarded the prestigious Perry F. Kendig Arts & Cultural Organization Award. In December 2021, at our Nutcracker performance the City of Roanoke read a proclamation declaring Southwest Virginia Ballet day in Roanoke VA, in recognition of our efforts to honor first responders and local heroes during the Pandemic. Many SVB Alumni continue to dance, choreograph, and teach around the world. Others are leaders in areas of arts, science, engineering, and business. This program for young dancers instills the discipline, teamwork, and dedication necessary to be successful in all aspects of life and fields of study and work.
